EARLY LIFE

Apr 9, 1896

Born in Schomberg, Ontario to Joseph 'Josiah' and Priscilla (Coulter) Brown. He was the younger brother of *Vincent Brown* and *Stanley Charles Brown*.





Private Harold Joseph Brown (age 20) was killed in action. He is buried at the Regina **Trench Cemetery,** in Somme, France.

When the great European War broke as a bolt from the blue, in 1914, many of the young men in and around Schomberg signed up and went overseas to take part in maintaining the principle upheld by the allied nations of the world. Many of these returned but many made the supreme sacrifice.

As a memorial to these unreturning brave, a monument was erected in the Agricultural Grounds. On this monument are engraved the following names:

MRS. PRISCILLA BROWN, wife of the late Josiah Brown, one of the younger children of John R. Brown, lives on the north-west corner of lot 32, concession 8, King, almost directly opposite to the school.

Mrs. Brown was married to Mr. Brown in March, 1883. Previous to that time, her name was Priscilla Coulter, a daugher of William Coulter, who lived west of Laskay. Mr. and Mrs. Brown farmed the first five years of their married life on lot 32, concession 8, King. Then Mr. Brown built a house on the corner of the farm, sold the rest of the farm and began a barber business in the village. At his death, in 1922, his oldest son, William, took over the business, and since that time has looked after the home.

The family are as follows: Mrs. Leonard Hill (Mary), William, Vincent, Mrs. Austin (Ethel), Stanley, Harold, Mrs. Monkman (Myrtle), Gladys, Verna and Byron.

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Stanley, Vincent and Harold served overseas in the Great War (1914-1918), Harold making the supreme sacrifice at the Somme in 1916.

PTE. H. J. BROWN KILLED.

Acording to official word received by his father, Mr. Joseph Brown of Schomberg. Ont., Pte. Harold J. Brown was killed in action on September 28. Pte. Brown, who was 19 years old, enlisted with the 74th Battalion. He went overseas in March and went into the trenches in June with the C.M.R. Two of his brothers

are on active service, V. E. Brown being now in the trenches with a draft of reinforcements furnished by the \$4th Battalion to a Toronto regiment. The other brother, Stanley, enlisted with the 209th Battalion at Swift Current.
