## EARLY LIFE

**Jan 8, 1885**

Born in King, Ontario to Thomas Kerr and Rose Ann (McKellar) Ferguson.

**1891 Census**

Lived in King, Ontario with Thomas Ferguson (head of house – father, age 40), Rose Ferguson (mother, age 28), Elmer Ferguson (brother, age 10), Charles Ferguson (brother, age 4), Laura Ferguson (sister, age 1) and James McKellar (maternal uncle, age 23).

**1901 Census**

Lived in King, Ontario with Thomas Ferguson (head of house – father, age 50), Rose Ferguson (mother, age 38), Elmer Ferguson (brother, age 20), Charles Ferguson (brother, age 13), Laura Ferguson (sister, age 11), George Ferguson (brother, age 9), Iva Ferguson (sister, age 7), Bertha Ferguson (sister, age 5) and Mildred Ferguson (sister, age 2).

Sapper Leonard Ferguson died on the R.M.S. Metagama. He is remembered at the **Halifax Memorial** in Halifax, Nova Scotia.

**Mar 5, 1918**

Age 33

There was a court of inquiry for his death. It was ruled that: "During a strong South East gale on March 4<sup>th</sup>, between 5:00pm and 6:00pm, the glass of a porthole close to the bunk occupied by #3056113 – Sapper L.L. Ferguson, # 29 O.S. Draft, Canadian Engineers, St. John's Quebec was smashed in with a tremendous crash. Sapper Ferguson lost consciousness and never regained same. The doctor was sent for at once and came just as soon as he had finished dressing the wounds of another man hurt by the same accident. He died about 10 or 15 minutes afterwards from natural causes directly due to the shock".

REMINISCENCES OF EVERSLEY, ONTARIO, King Township  
by Alice A. Ferguson (1950)

On the walls of St Andrews Presbyterian Church at Eversley hang two Honour Rolls of the boys who took part in both Wars.. How well I remember we would meet every week to fill boxes of food and things for these boys, sew them up in cotton and send them off. Rev Robert Brydon was minister at this time with dear old Dr. Carmichael assisting. He had retired after 50 years of service to the Tawse Manse House next to the Church. For 50 years he had lived at Strange, in the house that the congregation had built for him when he came to St Andrews Church in 1860 as the assisting minister to Rev John Tawse whose health was failing.

The Sunday School was flourishing and the Young People's Society and the Church Services were well attended every Sunday. All members of the families would attend divine worship, sometimes two pews were allotted to one family.
