AUBREY MILTON MARSHALL Aug. 30, 1889—Sept. 15, 1916
Private, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry.

Son of Edward Marshall; b. Strange; ed. King P.S., Aurora H.S.; Methodist Probationer, Cochrane District; Victoria College 1906-07, 1915-16; C.O.T.C.

In December 1915 he enlisted in the 5th Universities Company, P.P.C.L.I., and went overseas the following April. He joined the battalion in Flanders shortly after the battle of Sanctuary Wood in June 1916. Three months later he was killed in action at Courcelette.
