Soldier At Salisbury Who Came From Near Toronto.

Woodbridge, Feb. 9.—Pte. Roscoe Phillips, son of Mrs. Mary E. Phillips; who lives on a farm near Woodbridge, is officially reported to be seriously ill at Salisbury Plains. His mother received word last night to this effect. Pte. Phillips was well known in Woodbridge and Maple, and was one of the popular young men of the district. For a short time before he enlisted he was employed by the Dominion Messenger and Signal Company in Toronto, and when war broke out he enlisted with the 48th Highlanders.

Writing to his mother recently, he says that his battalion expected to leave for the front on February 7. Although quite well at the time of writing, he speaks of the wet and mud at Salisbury Plain as being a danger to health. Pte. Phillips is
